How would you change or improve the materials?

1. Lawyering has the challenging task of meeting a group of students with varied backgrounds and levels of experience with writing/research and bringing them up to speed on the practice. I think that this class was very helpful for the students who were newer to the work, but perhaps there could be additional opportunities for tailored help for those who came in with more experience. For those of us who have done a lot of writing, basic piece-by-piece instruction on how to put together a persuasive paragraph is less helpful, and it would be nice to have opportunities to talk about higher-level questions about argument structure.
2. n/a
3. Materials were great
4. At the start of the course, providing a legal writing worksheet that breaks down each sentence of the paragraph into the wanted skill. (just as an example).
5. The course as it is right now is perfect. The professor was extremely effective at teaching the materials and very considerate and thoughtful.
6. I think I would appreciate more practice with legal writing.
7. a little more general intro information/guidance at the start -- i know you have to be thrown in to a certain extend no matter what but I felt like some things could have been made clear in general with every class.
8. I would make more time for group interactions, which we did at the beginning of the year. Generally, I feel that lecturing is not the most effective method for this class. I would also potentially suggest a no-laptop policy for parts of it!
9. I thought Professor Aleem did an excellent job with the materials. I would maybe make the negotiation unit a bit longer and more organized generally.
10. Nothing!
11. I would maybe Gove some more time for the Brief and Oral Argument prep.
12. I think the negotiation materials could be set up differently because people were fairly confused
13. Professor Aleem gave us reasonable assignments and deadlines.

14. Not overlapping with other due dates, more examples of writing that are relevant
15. I really appreciated the conversations about the way law plays out in reality and issues of institutional bias, etc. I think more of that information would be really helpful, especially because we did not talk about it in doctrinals.
16. If possible (and I realize it may not be), it would be helpful to coordinate with doctrinal professors/admin so that big assignments for lawyering don't coincide with other big assignments (this year, for example, the first draft of the brief coincided with clinic applications right).
17. I wish there was a little more guidance at the beginning of the first semester on the basics of legal writing. I feel like we were thrown into the deep end and only given basic structures to format our assignments around. It would have been nice to see more examples of successful past student assignments (not on the same topics) to understand the target level of persuasiveness and advocacy that we should channel in our writing.
18. Genuinely, nothing. I found the transactional unit to be a little dull, but I don't plan on being a transactional attorney.
19. I wouldn't!
20. I'm glad that Professor Aleem was a strong advocate for group work -- to that end, I think even more group work could be added.

Not all courses raise issues of bias or stereotype in the law. But some do. If this course did, please comment on the way the professor dealt with those issues.

1. I think this needs work. We touched on the absolute basics of these issues -- mass incarceration, prosecutors' attitudes towards defendants -- but at a level barely above how the general public thinks about these things. We are going to be practitioners, and NYU has the resources and faculty to push us to think far more critically about these issues. ***The Contractualization of Disability Rights Law*, 92 U. CHI. L. REV. ____ (forthcoming 2025) [job market paper]**

This Article shows how, in interpreting disability rights statutes, many courts have turned to a wide array of contract doctrines, including the parol evidence rule, the duty of good faith, impossibility, materiality, mistake, and duress. In doing so, courts tend to use a commercial contract paradigm, designed to promote efficient transactions between corporations. This is problematic given that disability rights statutes seek to promote other goals, most notably

equality and human dignity. To address this problem, this Article proposes changing the contract paradigm upon which courts rely in adjudicating disability rights disputes—from a general, commercial approach to a set of rules that recognize the specific obstacles disabled individuals face, including information asymmetry and bargaining imbalances.

***Inverse Integration and the Relational Deficit of Disability Rights Law*, 124 COLUM. L. REV. 563 (2024) ([link](#))** [selected for the 2023 Michigan Law Junior Scholars Conference]

This Article documents and analyzes a previously overlooked model of disability integration, *inverse integration*, whereby nondisabled persons enter or participate in disability-focused settings or activities. It demonstrates how inverse integration fosters relationships by allowing disabled and nondisabled persons to share experiences, interests, and common language with family members, friends, and significant others. These interactive features of inverse integration, in turn, highlight disability law’s failure to protect and facilitate such interpersonal relationships.

***Reversing Reverse Mainstreaming*, 75 STAN. L. REV. 601 (2023) ([link](#))**

This Article investigates reverse mainstreaming—the practice of including *nondisabled* students in *special education* classrooms—as a form of integration. Drawing on a historical account and a systematic analysis of hundreds of administrative decisions, this Article exposes a conundrum: on the one hand, educators and judges have long justified reverse mainstreaming by pointing to its potential to reduce prejudice through structured interactions between disabled and nondisabled students. On the other hand, reverse mainstreaming often treats disabled students as inferior to their nondisabled peers and imposes mainstream norms at the expense of disability culture.

***Gambling on Disability Rights*, 43 COLUM. J.L. & ARTS 237 (2020) ([link](#))** [discussed in [Sportico: The Business of Sports](#)]

This Article argues that certain rules of leading U.S. sports organizations banning the disclosure of information that might be used for betting (“anti-tipping rules”) have a detrimental effect on athletes with psychosocial impairments because they prohibit athletes from disclosing information about their mental health. Drawing on the rule against insider trading in securities law, this Article proposes several strategies to address this problem.

Accommodative Contracts (with Szymon Osmola & Michael Stein)

This Article identifies a category of contracts that constitute, in and of themselves, “reasonable accommodations.” Specifically, such *accommodative contracts* allow individuals from certain social groups to address physical, structural, and attitudinal barriers that prevent them from participating in important social opportunities. Accommodative contracts can be found in several social domains, including employment (e.g., job-sharing contracts), reproduction (e.g.,

surrogacy contracts), financial and medical decision-making (e.g., supported-decision-making agreements), and housing (e.g., co-housing contracts). This Article argues that the overarching framework for evaluating accommodative contracts should be the law's commitment to advancing self-determination and substantive equality. To achieve these goals, we argue, the state must play an active role—as a lawmaker, employer, and contract enforcer—to promote accommodative contracts and create mandatory and default rules to protect vulnerable parties from abuse under such arrangements.

The Legal Side Effects of Alzheimer's Medication (with Dr. Mihir Gupta, Trevan Klug, Melisa Olgun & Rayyan Darji) [selected for the 8th Stanford Law and Society Conference for Junior Researchers]

As the U.S. population ages, Alzheimer's disease is becoming a major concern for many older adults. To date, however, pharmaceutical companies have yet to develop an effective medication to treat this disease. This Article shows that there is one area in which the use of Alzheimer's medication has been relatively impactful: private law litigation. We draw on an original dataset of "mental capacity" decisions to demonstrate how Alzheimer's drugs are being invoked by litigants who wish to challenge (or defend) the validity of a conveyance or will. Moreover, we empirically show that courts tend to engage with such evidence and, in some cases, attach great weight to the fact that the person whose capacity is challenged was prescribed an Alzheimer's drug. Our findings raise two points of concern. First, we find evidence that family members, who often play a role in the decisions surrounding Alzheimer's treatment, sometimes misuse the prescription of Alzheimer's medication to prove or disprove the legal capacity of the patient. Second, given that courts sometimes consider compliance with a medication regimen in determining one's capacity, there is a concern that some older adults would be "penalized" for failing to take certain drugs.

Tort Law, Disability, and the Privatization of the "Ugly Laws"

This Article analyzes two recent California lawsuits in which the plaintiffs claimed that the behavior of an autistic child in a neighboring house constituted a "nuisance." Situating these lawsuits in a historical context helps conceptualize them as reflecting two disturbing developments. The first concerns the use of the law to exclude disabled people from certain spaces. In the past, municipalities used nuisance ordinances (known as "ugly laws") to criminalize people with visible impairments simply for being out in public spaces. This Article argues that, in some respects, the California lawsuits reflect the privatization of such "ugly laws." The second development has to do with the intersection of disability and torts. In a groundbreaking 1966 article, scholar Jacobus tenBroek proposed a tort reform that would establish disabled people's "right to live in the world." Conversely, the California cases reflect a use of tort law for a very different purpose: whereas tenBroek promoted disability integration, the plaintiffs in those lawsuits sought to exclude disabled people from their neighborhoods. Taken together, I conclude, these developments paint a very grim picture of how legal norms shape social integration in contemporary society.

Integration-Integration Tradeoffs [draft available upon request]

This Article argues that, fifty years after Congress first introduced the "integration presumption" in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, we still do not fully understand what "integration" means. The statute refers to two meanings of integration: (1) placement of disabled students in the general education classroom and (2) intergroup interactions between

disabled and nondisabled children. These two definitions are not identical and can dictate different, even conflicting, remedies. Nevertheless, courts and scholars have so far conflated these meanings. This Article exposes the tensions between the two meanings of integration, traces their distinct justifications, and illustrates the core tradeoffs that arise when these meanings clash. Such conflicts, which I refer to as *integration-integration tradeoffs*, occur when promoting one meaning of disability integration hinders the other. For example, moving from an in-person method of instruction to a fully virtual one may increase the number of disabled children studying in the general education environment, but this can also diminish the quality and frequency of interactions between disabled students and their nondisabled peers. This Article concludes by offering insights into how to manage such integration-integration tradeoffs.

Equal Protection

Griffith v. El Paso County, Colorado et al., 23-1135 (10th Cir.). Co-author and signatory of amici brief filed on behalf of legal scholars of sex and gender in transgender woman pretrial detainee's case challenging sexual harassment and abuse in county prison. The core issue on appeal is what degree of judicial scrutiny should be applied to transgender persons' equal protection challenges to gender classifications along with harassment and abuse. Amici contend intermediate scrutiny applies. This case is pending at the Tenth Circuit.

Kadel v. Folwell, 100 F.4th 122 (4th Cir. 2024). Joined brief amici curiae of Constitutional law professors in support of state employees and Medicaid recipients arguing that trans healthcare bans constitute facial sex discrimination and that *Geduldig v. Aiello* (1974) does not preclude such holding. Our position was ultimately adopted by the Fourth Circuit sitting en banc.

Election Law

Yang et al. v. New York State Bd. of Elections et al., 960 F.3d 119 (2d Cir. 2020). Author of amici brief filed in May 2020 on behalf of 266 registered New York State democratic voters submitted in emergency action challenging New York State Board of Election's decision to cancel the 2020 Democratic Primary. Brief elevated voters' diverse reasons for desiring that the Primary be held. The Second Circuit ultimately sided with the voters.

Full Faith and Credit

Marnie Gracey v. Marwan Albawardi et al., 2024-0394-LWW (Del. Ch.). Lead counsel for private individual objecting to premature enforcement of foreign trial court judgment in Delaware pending appeal of merits case in the Kansas Court of Appeals on the grounds that Full Faith and Credit is not due. Litigation is ongoing.

Nationwide Injunctions

Texas et al. v. United States et al., 7:16-cv-00054-O (N.D. Tex.), 16-11534 (5th Cir.). Lead counsel for Dr. Rachel Tudor, in novel attack on nationwide transgender bathroom injunction brought by fifteen state and local entities against the federal government. Tudor's Oklahoma Title VII case was stayed by injunction, so Tudor went to Fifth Circuit requesting intervention on appeal so that she could defend her right to redress sex discrimination and retaliation as a transgender person under Title VII. In March 2017, the State Plaintiffs agreed to drop their lawsuit, dissolving the bathroom injunction, and allowing Tudor to return to prosecute her case in Oklahoma.

Tenure Denial

Cheryl Butler v. Southern Methodist University et al., 24-0616 (SCOTX), 23-10072 (5th Cir.), 3:18-cv-37 (N.D. Tex.). Discrimination case challenging tenure denial and defamation. Brought on to handle opposition to summary judgment and other equitable motion practice at trial court. Continued on as sole counsel for appeal to the Fifth Circuit which held oral argument in February 2024. In August 2024, the Fifth Circuit granted my suggestion and certified a question of Texas law to the Supreme Court of Texas, which was accepted. Oral argument in the Supreme Court of Texas to be held on October 31, 2024.

United States and Rachel Tudor v. Se. Okla. State Univ. and Reg'l Univ. of Okla., 13 F.4th 1019 (10th Cir. 2021), 5:15-cv-324 (W.D. Okla.). Title VII sex discrimination and retaliation case seeking to remedy wrongful denial of tenure and termination of transgender female professor. Lead author of response briefs that successfully survived motion to dismiss (2015 WL 4606079), summary judgment (2017 WL 4849118), and JNOV/New Trial. Served as lead counsel at trial, securing first of its kind jury in November 2017. Lead author of appellate briefs and motions, securing reinstatement with tenure on appeal (13 F.4th 1019).

Attorneys' Fees

Tudor v. Galindo et al., 5:22-cv-480 (W.D. Okla.). Dispute seeking legal and equitable relief for pay of attorneys' due to counsel in original Title VII enforcement suit. We oppose former client's bid to bring interpleader action purporting to force all counsel to split artificially small "fund" established by settling around attorney interests contrary to Oklahoma law. Separately, former counsel bring suit against former client, her new personal attorney, and the State of Oklahoma for settling around our interests. Motions seeking a finding that former client brought interpleader with unclean hands requiring its dismissal are pending.

Family Law

Marwan Albawardi v. Marnie Gracey, 127,422 (Kan. Ct. App.). Lead counsel on appeal challenging finding that client who twice divorced his spouse entered into a common law marriage upon stepping on Kansas nearly soil a decade after the fact.

Education Discrimination

Dep't of Ed. V. State of Louisiana, Nos. 24A78 and 24A79 (U.S.). Joined Brief of Statutory Interpretation and Equality Law Scholars as amici curiae in support of applications for partial stays of injunctions. We argue that Title IX's proscription of sex discrimination protects gay and trans students.

Gloucester Cnty. Sch. Bd. v. G.G., By His Next Friend and Mother, Deidre Grimm, No. 16-273 (U.S.). Author of *amici* brief filed on behalf of 101 Transgender Americans in support of Gavin Grimm's right to use boy's restroom at his public high school in Virginia. Brief, a collaborative project between Transgender Legal Defense and Education Fund and Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton LLP, presented legal analysis explaining how Title IX secures identity-based access to segregated restrooms in public schools as well as presented anecdotes from transgender Americans that highlight the import of those protections.

Healthcare Discrimination

Darin B. v. OPM, 2017 WL 1103712 (EEOC). Title VII and Rehabilitation Act discrimination case seeking to remedy wrongful denial of chest reconstruction surgery sought by transgender man as treatment for gender dysphoria. Published March 2017 Commission decision found for first time that transition related health care discrimination violates Title VII's sex discrimination proscription and *may* constitute disability discrimination in violation of Rehabilitation Act.

Lauderdale v. United Healthcare, 2016 WL 1470038 (HHS). Medicare appeal seeking coverage of vaginal reconstruction surgery for intersex, transgender veteran with multiple disabilities. Secured first of its kind published decision from Medicare Appeals Council ordering Medicare Advantage plan to cover vaginal reconstruction surgery in January 2016.

Tovar v. Essentia Health et al., 857 F.3d 771 (8th Cir. 2017). Lead author of *amici* brief filed in October 2016 on behalf of Transgender Legal Defense and Education Fund, World Professional Association for Transgender Health, and Whitman Walker Health. Brief supported mother of transgender child challenging denial of transition health care under her employer provided health plan. Brief elevated issues of liability under Title VII, the Minnesota Human Rights Act, and the Affordable Care Act. The Eighth Circuit ultimately adopted positions proposed by the brief in a published opinion. Case settled out of court.

Rumble v. Fairview Health Servs. et al., 14-cv-2037 (D. Minn.). Lead author of *amicus* brief filed in December 2016 on behalf of Transgender Legal Defense and Education Fund. Brief supported transgender man seeking to redress heinous discrimination endured in private hospital setting. Brief provided comprehensive analysis of liability under the Affordable Care Act and the Minnesota Human Rights Act as well as presented analysis of prevalence of transgender health setting discrimination. The Eighth Circuit adopted *amici*'s position on the liability of third-party beneficiaries (857 F.3d 771). Case settled out of court.

Employment Discrimination

Allegra Schawe-Lane and Dane Lane v. Amazon.com.KYDC LLC, 2:17-cv-134 (E.D. Ky.). Title VII, ADA, and state analogue claims brought by transgender woman and nontransgender husband seeking to remedy harassment, discrimination, retaliation, and constructive discharge in Amazon fulfillment facilities in Kentucky. Served as lead counsel at EEOC charge stage and secured cause findings against Amazon. In January 2019, case was amicably settled.

EEOC and Brittany Austin v. Deluxe Fin. Servs, 0:15-cv-02646 (D. Minn.). Title VII and ADA case seeking to remedy hostile work environment, sex discrimination, and retaliation endured by transgender woman in Arizona call center. Co-litigated case with EEOC, ultimately securing consent decree and \$115,000 settlement in January 2016.

Chavez v. Credit Nation Auto Sales, LLC, 641 Fed.Appx. 883 (11th Cir. 2016). Title VII sex discrimination case seeking to remedy wrongful termination of transgender woman. Served as second chair on case on appeal and co-authored merits and reply briefs, ultimately securing reversal of summary judgment. Case later settled out of court.

EEOC v. Lakeland Eye Center, 8:14-cv-2421 (M.D. Fla.). Title VII case seeking to remedy wrongful termination of transgender woman. Co-litigated case with EEOC, ultimately securing consent decree and \$150,000 settlement in April 2015.

Jamal v. Saks & Company, 4:14-cv-02782 (S.D. Tex.). Title VII case seeking to remedy harassment and wrongful termination of transgender woman. Lead drafter of opposition to motion to dismiss for failure to state a claim that resulted in defendant withdrawing its motion. In March 2015, case was amicably settled.

Rethinking the Role of Intentional Wrongdoing in Criminal Law

113 CALIFORNIA LAW REVIEW ____ (forthcoming 2025) (Job Market Paper) ([SSRN Link](#))

It is a foundational assumption of the traditional mens rea hierarchy that a defendant who causes some harm intentionally ought to be subject to more liability than a defendant who causes the same harm unintentionally through recklessness or negligence. This Article questions the soundness of that assumption. It identifies and articulates an especially important set of ‘avoidance-commitments’ which are manifested in the case of reluctant purposeful agents but absent in the case of callous agents, and which speak in favor of diminished liability for many purposeful agents relative to their reckless or negligent counterparts. In so arguing, the Article highlights how the criminal law’s current mens rea hierarchy, while seemingly ideologically neutral, in fact evinces a commitment on the part of the state toward punishing more severely those who commit purposeful crimes of desperation, while excusing those in positions of wealth or power who commit non-intentional crimes of convenience, while unwilling or unmotivated to seek out or take easily available options to avoid wronging their victims.

Rights, Reasons, and Culpability in Tort Law and Criminal Law, RIGHTS IN CRIMINAL LAW (Philipp-Alexander Hirsch & Elias Moser eds.) (forthcoming 2025) ([SSRN Link](#))

This Article considers how a mens rea regime growing out of principles of corrective or restorative justice, taken by many theorists to underly tort law, differs from the kind of mens rea regimes which arise in a system of criminal law grounded in more traditional retributivist, expressivist, or deterrence-based principles. Recent scholarly proposals to import restorative and corrective justice approaches to criminal law are often motivated by the view that, by eschewing punitive punishments, such approaches are less harmful toward defendants. This Article argues, in contrast, that a more traditional “offender-centric” criminal law focused on the degree of blameworthiness of the defendant actually affords less culpable defendants more protection than would a victim-centric criminal law, modeled after tort law and grounded in principles of corrective or restorative justice.

Attempt Liability, invited submission for CORE CONCEPTS IN CRIMINAL LAW AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE (Antony Duff and Kai Ambos eds.) (co-authored)

This Article explores the foundational principles and concepts that underly the different approaches to attempt doctrine in Anglo-American and German criminal law. The Article’s central thesis is that the scope of attempt liability is most fruitfully understood as a society’s effort to balance competing commitments to two normative principles: the rejection of moral luck on the one hand, and the right to mental autonomy underlying thought crime prohibitions on the other. Differences between Anglo-American and German law with respect to the degree of punishment, the line between act and preparation, and the mens rea requirements for attempt liability are a function of the different weights each society respectively places on these two competing normative principles.

Judicial Disagreement and The Role of Higher-Order Evidence in Legal Reasoning, invited submission for forthcoming symposium issue of YALE JOURNAL OF LAW AND THE HUMANITIES

This Article harnesses an important distinction in social epistemology between “lower-order” evidence and “higher-order” evidence to push back against recent arguments by Eric Posner, Adrian Vermeule, William Baude, and Ryan Doerfler for the thesis that judges on multi-member tribunals have an

obligation to defer to the opinions of their colleagues when deciding a case. The Article argues (a) that a strong epistemic case can be made that, in contexts like that of a judicial tribunal, where justices have access to the underlying reasoning behind the judgments of those who disagree with them, it is rationally appropriate to ignore higher-order evidence consisting in the fact of disagreement and (b) that even if higher order evidence *did* provide epistemic reasons to defer, judges would still have distinctively legal obligations to ignore such higher-order evidence when deciding a case, grounded in the difference between the nature of legal reasons and epistemic reasons. One upshot of my position is that insofar as it is ever appropriate for a judge to take judicial disagreement into account, it is in their choice of initial interpretive methodology, rather than in the methodology's application to a particular case. This provides some rational pressure for judges to reason as methodological pluralists, regardless of what they personally think about the first-order merits of any interpretive schema.

Grounding Tort Law's 'Intervening Actor' Doctrine

Tort law's 'intervening actor' doctrine traditionally functions to relieve plaintiffs of liability as a matter of law in cases of negligence involving the intervening actions of third party actors. Against recent criticism, I identify a novel justification for the doctrine, grounded in the 'right to trust'. If the State treats a plaintiff as negligent for failing to foresee a risk of the theft and subsequent misuse of their property (e.g., by leaving their car unlocked), tort law would endorse a legal obligation for citizens to believe of their neighbors that they are criminals. Though the statistical likelihood of such crimes may make them foreseeable, a legal requirement to suspect the worst of one's fellow community members would violate our right to mental autonomy and undermine an important public policy interest in making space for trusting interpersonal relationships in the private sphere. It would also run counter to much of criminal and civil procedure, where such statistical inferences of future criminality are legally prohibited. One interesting and important upshot of this account of the intervening actor doctrine in terms of mental autonomy is that it justifies the doctrine only for natural persons. The theory can thus help explain why corporate persons, unlike individuals, should still be found negligent for failing to protect plaintiffs from the foreseeable tortious or criminal actions of third parties.

Edward R. Morrison, Belisa Pang & Antoine Uettwiller, Race and Bankruptcy: Explaining Racial Disparities in Consumer Bankruptcy, 63 J.L. & ECON. 269 (2020).

Abstract African American bankruptcy filers select Chapter 13 far more often than other debtors, who opt instead for Chapter 7 with higher success rates and lower attorneys' fees. Prior scholarship blames racial discrimination by attorneys. We propose an alternative explanation: Chapter 13 offers benefits, including retention of cars and driver's licenses, that are more valuable to African American debtors because of relatively long commutes. We study a 2011 policy change in Chicago, which seized cars and suspended licenses of consumers with large traffic-related debts. The policy produced a large increase in Chapter 13 filings, especially by African Americans. Two mechanisms explain the disparate racial impact: African Americans were more likely to have traffic debts and incurred greater costs from car seizures and license suspension due to relatively long commutes. When we match African Americans to other debtors with similar commutes, we find no racial difference in Chapter 13 filing propensities.

Edward R. Morrison, Belisa Pang & Jonathon Zytnick, Manipulating Random Assignment: Evidence from Consumer Bankruptcies in the Nation's Largest Cities, AM. L. & ECON. REV. (forthcoming).

Abstract Random case assignment is common in courts because it helps guard against favoritism (actual or perceived) and, in bankruptcy cases, affects ex ante incentives. Despite its importance, random assignment is failing in several major bankruptcy courts today. We show this using data on the assignment of trustees to Chapter 7 cases in Chicago, Los Angeles, and New York. These trustees audit the debtor's finances, find and liquidate assets, and police compliance with rules. We find evidence that the random-assignment process is failing in two courts (Chicago and New York). We dig deeper into the Chicago data and find that attorneys strategically time case filings to avoid or attract particular trustees ("trustee shopping"), who differ substantially in the aggressiveness with which they audit the debtor's finances. By contrast, among cases filed by debtors who have not hired attorneys ("pro se filers"), there is no case imbalance across trustees. Because they do not engage in manipulation, pro se filers—who account for the bottom decile of income and asset values among Chapter 7 debtors—are most burdened by trustee-shopping. We conclude by presenting evidence that trustee-shopping is less prevalent in Los Angeles due to critical differences in its random-assignment protocol.

Katherine Fang & Belisa Pang, Parental Obligations in Bankruptcy, *AM. BANKR. L.J.* (forthcoming).

Abstract Being a parent is difficult. This is particularly true for women undergoing Chapter 13 bankruptcy. Using a novel dataset comprising 102,952 bankruptcy cases across 64 districts, we find that debtors with dependents are not only more likely to choose Chapter 13 over the quicker and simpler Chapter 7, but also 8 percentage points more likely to fail at that bankruptcy—defined as having their cases dismissed within three years—compared to other individuals in Chapter 13 bankruptcy. This effect is persistent even after we control for gender, marital status, financial information (asset, liability, income, expenses, etc.), and district and year fixed effects. The effect of raising children is particularly acute for women, whose failure rate within three years is 10.2 percentage points higher if they have dependents. Although joint filers are about 6.7 percentage points less likely to have their cases dismissed, the overall effect of being married is not statistically significant and does not reduce the negative effect of parental obligations.

Belisa Pang & Emile Shehada, *Note*, One Size Fits None: An Overdue Reform for Chapter 7 Trustees, 133 *YALE L.J.* 782 (2022).

Belisa Pang, Invisible Mortgages in Bankruptcy (Job Market Paper).

Abstract This paper identifies a previously unexplored channel through which bankruptcy can impact consumer welfare: the presence of retained mortgages and their invisibility in credit reports following bankruptcy. Using credit bureau data, my study unveils that approximately 70% of mortgages included in Chapter 7 bankruptcy and 56% of those in Chapter 13 bankruptcy remained current until filing. Similarly, court records indicate that 74% of mortgagors in Chapter 7 intended to retain their mortgages, even though only 7% formalized a reaffirmation agreement. Public records confirmed that only 7% of the properties intended to be retained were foreclosed over the next three years, compared to 69% of the properties intended to be surrendered. This implies that a substantial proportion of bankrupt homeowners did not default on their mortgages, allowing them to retain their homes and associated mortgages. However, this paper shows that nearly 79% of these mortgages disappeared from their credit reports or stopped being updated when bankruptcy happened. In other words, the homeowners stopped getting credit for keeping their mortgages current; their mortgages became invisible. Using event studies, this paper shows that this mortgage invisibility harms these homeowners, leading to a 15 to 30-point reduction in their credit scores, a \$1,500 decrease in their credit card limits, and a 1 percentage point increase in their auto loan interest rates. Therefore, this paper advocates for reporting practice changes to better reflect the financial realities of retained mortgages in bankruptcy.

Belisa Pang, The Bankruptcy Revolving Door.

Abstract Using credit report data dating back to 1997, this study unveils that nearly 46% of consumer bankruptcy filings in 2023 came from people with a prior bankruptcy record. This percentage has increased at an average rate of 61 basis points per year since 2016. The majority of repeat filings occur after a discharged case rather than a dismissed one, and nearly half of refilers have previously filed under Chapter 7, challenging conventional beliefs about repeated filings. Moreover, the temporal gap between successive filings is substantial, with most refilings occurring over 7 years after the initial filing. This paper then reveals that a person's past filings are strongly correlated with increased future filings after 7 years, even after controlling for a wide range of variables including debt levels and demographic characteristics. Therefore, this paper contends that the prevalence of refiling can be attributed to two main reasons: first, individuals with a prior bankruptcy frequently face new financial distress, and second, they are more predisposed to file for bankruptcy compared to those with no bankruptcy record.
